

ABOUT Danbi's Favorite Day

The story is set on Children's Day, when countries around the world celebrate children as the leaders of tomorrow. Danbi invites her friends to celebrate with her, and promises kites, tigers, and magic train rides. But when the reality of a picnic behind her parents' deli falls short of her grand plans, Danbi must get creative to save the day. Danbi's Favorite Day is about the magic that happens we come together to celebrate, and the universal message that happiness lies not in what you have, but in who you have.

ANNA KIM is the author-illustrator of *Danbi's Favorite Day*. She was born in Seoul, South Korea, and grew up in New York City. After training as a classical pianist and earning a B.A. in Psychology from Wellesley College, Anna devoted herself to teaching music to children. While looking for picture books for her nieces, she wished there were more character-based stories for our multicultural world. That's when she created the indomitable Danbi and her diverse friends, hoping that young readers will grow to celebrate with her the multi-colored world we live in and the magic of friendship. Anna's first picture book, *Danbi Leads the School Parade* received the Asian/Pacific American Award for Literature Honor Award. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS FOR READ ALOUD

Front and Back Covers

- Read the title. Can you guess Danbi's favorite day?
- What is your favorite day?
- Share some of your favorite days, especially your childhood favorite.

Front Matter Pages - Dedication Page

What do you think of the way Danbi is walking?
 What does it say about her?

Danbi and her classmates (pp. 2-3)

- How do Danbi's classmates react to her invitation?
 How can you tell?
- Do you think Danbi's classmates will go to her party?
 Why or why not?

At the store - Party setup (pp. 4-9)

- How does Danbi's mom respond to Danbi's promises to her friends?
- How do you think Danbi's mom is feeling?
 What about Danbi?
- What warning does Danbi ignore? Why does she ignore it? Do you think it is a good idea?

Friends arrive (pp. 10-11)

- How does Danbi show that she cares about her friends?
- Does this day seem like an important day to her? Why?

Storm! (pp. 12-19)

- Why does the storm represent a turning point in the story?
- Why is Danbi thinking, "It was just as mommy said"?
- How are Danbi and her friends feeling?

Saving the party (pp. 20-23)

- Follow Danbi. What do Danbi's actions show about her? How do Danbi's actions change her friends' minds? How does she feel in response?
- Follow David. How do Danbi's actions change David's mind?
- An old saying goes, "When life gives you lemons, make lemonade." It means when life throws difficult situations at you, you can make the best of them.

How Children's Day Came About in S. Korea

Children's Day, pronounced 어린이 날, "eorininal" in Korean, dates back to the 1920s, during one of the most difficult times in Korean history. The writer and activist Bang Jeong Hwan realized the importance of educating children and was convinced that children were the future of the country. At that time, children tended to attend only elementary schools, which couldn't provide the education needed to improve the country's future. He dedicated himself to the development of children's education and the improvement of their living conditions. He also published a series of fairy tales with educational texts that denounced the difficulties of childhood. To further promote his ideas, he established a day dedicated entirely to children, which eventually became Children's Day, a national holiday celebrated on May 5th each year.

LANGUAGE ARTS 1

LESSON IDEA: STORY ELEMENTS

Character, Theme, Language, Compare & Contrast

CHARACTER

A. Lead a discussion about Danbi's journey, including goals, obstacles, actions, and Aha! moment.





1. Goals

- a. Have a great party.
- b. Impress her friends.



2. Obstacles

- a. Mom can't afford the time or money.
- b. A torrential rain.



3. Actions

- a. Picks herself up after the storm.
- b. Imagines a new game.



4. Aha! moment

- a. Together, we could do so much.
- b. It's not what you have but who you have.
- B. Explain the importance of raising emotional stakes in storytelling; without that, a happy ending isn't satisfying to the reader. Show how Danbi's emotions go through a roller-coaster, as she overcomes the obstacles the author places in her way.

- 1. Danbi invites her friends and makes big promises. (EXCITED)
- 2. Mom deflates Danbi's ambitious plans. (DISAPPOINTED)



3. Danbi sets up the party, welcomes her friends. (HAPPY)





6. Friends are bored and want to leave. (UPSET)



- 7. Danbi makes a sandwich and others join.
- 8. Danbi welcomes kids to the neighborhood party. (JOYFUL)
- 9. Danbi realizes it was a beautiful Children's Day. (PROUD)

(UPBEAT)

ASK students what Danbi would have learned if the storm had not happened.

- How would the story have changed?
- Would Danbi have learned as much if everything had gone smoothly?

Compare & Contrast

Compare and contrast Danbi Leads the School Parade with Danbi's Favorite Day.

- · Character: How has Danbi evolved?
 - Speaks English

 - · Colored Drawings vs. Paintings



- More advanced students can look at story structure.
- · What are the high and low points?
- · Where do these points fall in the story?

THEME

Everyday Heroes

- Being a hero is not just about having extraordinary physical or mental powers.
- It's about showing courage and strength to help others and face adversity with great strength.
 (See Worksheet)
 - 1. What are some hero qualities you can think of?
 - 2. What are Danbi's hero qualities?
 - 3. What are your hero qualities?
 - 4. Do you always show them? If not, why not?
 - 5. Who are your heroes?



Community

- Define the word "community" for the class, particularly the role of friends and acquaintances.
- The second to the last sentence in the book is, "It was about being together." What did Danbi mean? (See Worksheet)
 - 1. Ask the class to identify the communities in the book.
 - 2. What does Danbi do to bring her communities (friends and neighbors) together?
 - 3. What does it mean to be part of a community?
 - 4. What are your communities?



LANGUAGE

Figurative Language

- Define figurative language. Some compare two different ideas using the words "like" or "as."
- What do these expressions from the book mean?
 - 1. "I've got butterflies in my tummy."
 - 2."The sky roared, and wind tore through the alley."
 - 3. "...our street lit up like a blaze of fire,"
 - 4. "Waterdrops bounced like jewels in the sun."




Extension

Further the discussion with deeper questions about community.

- How does this story show how we can come together as a community?
- How could you use the lesson about heroes and community in your own lives?







SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING

LESSON IDEA

EMOTIONAL GROWTH

Growing is not just about growing taller; it is also about better understanding the world and ourselves. We grow kinder and wiser as we experience life and take on new challenges.

• How does Danbi grow in the story?





IDENTIFY THOUGHTS AND FEELINGS

- 1) Chart Danbi's emotions
 - Give each student a copy of the **Mood Chart Handout**. Then, after the read aloud, ask students to identify Danbi's emotions in each scene by pointing to the drawings on the Mood Chart.
 - Invite students to take the Mood Chart handout home and discuss naming emotions with a grown-up.
- 2) Identify your feelings and those of others
 - Give each student a copy of the Draw That Feeling Worksheet, and divide the class in teams of four.
 - Have students follow the instructions on the worksheet by identifying their feelings and those of their teammates.

LEAD DISCUSSIONS ABOUT . . .

- 1) Your feelings . . .
- When reality doesn't match expectations, how can we keep going?
- Have you ever been disappointed by a broken promise? How did you feel and what did you do?
- Have you ever broken a promise to a friend?
 How did your friend feel, and what did you do?

- 2) Danbi's feelings . . .
 - How do you think Danbi felt when the storm ruined everything? How did her friends lend help?
- Pretend you are at Danbi's party. What would you say to Danbi when her hopes of the party fell apart?
- Tell Danbi what you like most about her party and write her a thank you note. (Advanced students)





Celebrate

SOCIAL STUDIES

LESSON IDEA: CELEBRATE CHILDREN'S DAY!

Remind students what Danbi's mother says about Children's Day: "It's about celebrating all the children on Earth who will one day lead the world!"

Ask the class

- What does it mean that children are the leaders of tomorrow?
- Do you want to be a leader too? What does that mean to you?
- · How will you lead the world to a better place?
- Why does Danbi say, "We were the children of the world?" (Point out the group's diversity.)



Host a Children's Day lunch party

- Listen to "Happy Children's Day," a song by **JunyTony**, and read aloud the lyrics. Have a class sing-along. (https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=fWBvVtXdTJk)
- Holidays from around the world: Have each child share the special holidays they celebrate at home.
- "Foods from Around the World" lunch hour: Let parents know that the class is hosting a lunch hour with an international food theme, and have children bring their favorite lunch for Show & Tell.

Have students draw a mural together

- The last illustration of the book (left page) shows a mural of Danbi and her friends, and on the right page (under the jacket flap) the words, "Hope, Love, Peace." After reviewing this mural and discussing its meaning with students, choose a mural theme for your class.
- Have students brainstorm images/symbols/words for the mural. For example, protecting the planet, international foods or animals from around the world. Have students draw that mural as a team on the white board.

Thoughts on Children's Day

- In South Korea, Children's Day is a major national holiday celebrated on May 5th. It is dedicated to celebrating children and their importance to the future of the nation. All non-essential businesses close, and families focus on making the day special for kids. There are parades, picnics, TaeKwonDo showcases, and other fun activities such as visiting zoos, aquariums, and amusement parks.
- Children's Day is celebrated in many parts of the world on different days. World Children's Day is observed on November 20th with UNICEF's mission of protecting the rights of every child.









UNDERSTANDING EMOTIONS

 It's important to understand how people feel so we can respond in a caring way and be better friends.









